Agriculture in the Community Grant

The Knox County Farm Bureau Foundation Board is pleased to announce the May 2025 Agriculture in the Community Grant recipient. The Galesburg FFA Chapter has been awarded \$1,975.29 for their project, Galesburg FFA/OSF Community Garden. The community garden will be a partnership between Galesburg schools and OSF St. Mary's Hospital. FFA students will be responsible for planting and maintaining the garden, allowing students to have a Supervised Agriculture Education (SAE) project no matter where they live within the Galesburg School District. When ready, the community garden will be open to anyone within the Galesburg community or anyone that provides volunteer assistance within the garden.

The next round of Agriculture in the Community Grant applications are due August 1, 2025. Remember, these grants are available to teachers, FFA Chapters & 4-H Clubs, and community groups wanting to signify the importance of agriculture in Knox County.


Because so many classrooms wanted to raise chicks, it became obvious that we needed another farmer to help with eggs.
