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

The 4-H Fair countdown begins in our household. Our son joined the club this year, so I expect many fair-time scenes worth capturing by mind or camera. I also anticipate a moment or more of drained batteries. Last-minute project preparations and dawn-to-dusk days at the fair with livestock will do that to a person.

So will the fair's signature heat and crying cats.

Our farm cat last year made clear that he disliked traveling by vehicle. He equally vocalized his disapproval as an exhibit for our daughter's 4-H cat care project. Fellow moms stood nearby their minivan hatchbacks and handed general show projects to their kids with a whining cat as their background music. With blue ribbon earned, I summoned my husband to take "Prince" home as soon as possible.

Moments like these make me appreciate my own parents even more, yet realize why they plodded through project mishaps or stresses when my brother and I were kids. Thankfully, we laugh about the feline fiasco and look at the collective 4-H picture. What a joyful, satisfying feeling to watch your kids personally grow, learn life skills and discover their passions. Quite frankly,

I find it thrilling to relive the 4-H experience through them. I watch them learn to cook on their own, grow green beans, construct a wood project, craft a junk drawer robot and raise chicks from two days old. They gain the confidence to speak with adult judges about their experiences. I see them strengthen decision-making skills and tap their creativity. They feel good about themselves, make new friends with similar values, and experience the motivation to make their best better.

For some inspirational thoughts about today's youth, I recommend a stop to your local 4-H Fair. Browse through the general project displays, walk through the livestock barns, and see what they have accomplished. The project showcase in my county reminds me that much has stayed the same about 4-H's traditions, impact and values. Yet, the nation's largest youth organization evolves. Expanding project selections and new learning experiences invigorate young, modern minds – and even my own at a generation removed.

Ten Tips to Get Your Vehicle Ready for Vacation

You're all set, the hotel reservation is made, the car's packed and the travel route is planned. But what about your car? Is it ready for the trip?

Whether you're planning a long trip or a short one, nothing ruins a vacation faster than car trouble. A quick, thorough checkup by a local automotive specialist or yourself can save you a vacation-load of trouble.

Keeping that in mind, here are 10 useful tips that should help get your vehicle ready for a vacation drive:

1.Check the oil and have it changed if necessary. Also check the oil filter. Fresh oil will get you better gas mileage.

2.Inspect the radiator and radiator hose. Don't get stalled on the side of the road with an overheated vehicle.

3.Check the suspension and steering. Loose suspension and uneven steering prevent a comfortable and safe ride and can even cause carsickness.

4.Check all fluid levels. These include brake fluid, transmission fluid, power steering fluid and engine coolant. Also look under your vehicle for fluid on the ground. Leaks and low fluid levels can damage your vehicle and leave you stranded.

5.Inspect your windshield and windows.

Repair chips and cracks, clean all the windows, check the windshield wipers and make sure the windshield washer reservoir is filled. Replace the windshield and windshield wipers and clean bugs and road film from the windshield, if needed.

6.Check the condition of your braking system. This system includes brake linings, pads and drums. A vehicle's braking system should be checked every 15,000 miles. Leaky brake fluids and worn pads and drums can cause you some serious problems down the road.

7. Have your battery tested. Replace it if it has lost a significant amount of power. It's cheaper to replace it now than on the road where you might have the added cost of a service call.

8.Check the tires, including the spare tire. Make sure they are properly inflated. Look for breaks and blisters in the sidewalls and excessive or uneven wear. If you don't, a tire could blow out.

9.Test all lights on the vehicle. These include headlights (bright and dim), parking lights, taillights, brake lights, backup lights and turn signals. Don't waste your time replacing burnt out lights on the road.

10. Make sure you pack a travel kit. Include a tire-changing kit, a heavy-

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
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duty flashlight, a first aid kit, a small fire extinguisher, a towel or blanket and bottled water. Pack these necessities on top of your luggage so you can find them fast in an emergency. It's better to be safe than sorry. Don't wait for something bad to happen on the road. 
more members and aiding in improving the agricultural knowledge in Knox County.

Defensive Driving Course To Be Offered


Are you interested in learning updated rules of the road while saving money on your car insurance, you should enroll in the Defensive Driving Course that is being offered on August 10th and 11th from 10:00 am to 3:30 pm at the Knox Agri Center in Galesburg.

The Knox County Farm Bureau and COUNTRY Financial will be sponsoring the presentation. The course is open to people 55 years of age and older who are farm bureau members and COUNTRY insureds. The registration fee of \$20 covers course materials, instruction and lunch both days. Those completing the course are eligible for a discount on their auto insurance, but they must attend both days to qualify. An examination is not required to complete the course or receive certification.

This program was developed by

the National Safety Council and is internationally recognized for its significant contribution to our nation's traffic safety effort. The course is very informative, entertaining and current with the present program recently being updated to reflect today's driving standards and environment. The instructor will be Doug Sommer, Pekin, Illinois who was a safety educator with COUNTRY Financial for over 30 years. After his retirement from the insurance company Doug started his own safety business, Sommer's Safety Sessions which offers safety programs, seminars and the Defensive Driving Course.

Knox Community Health Center to Offer School & Sports Physicals

The school year is almost here, but will your child be ready? Besides shopping for supplies, your back-to-school checklist should include making sure your child has an up-todate health record.

School and sports physical exams will be offered this summer by staff at the Knox Community Health Center, 1361 W. Fremont St, Galesburg. Junior and senior high school athletic physicals will be offered as will school physicals for preschoolers, kindergartners, sixth graders, and freshmen.

School physicals will be offered for \$35 and sports physicals for \$15 **BY APPOINTMENT ONLY** on the following dates from 8am to 6pm each day: (Immunizations are not included in cost of physical, cost will vary.)

June 8th, 9th, 27th, & 29th July 20th & 21st August 1st, 3rd, 8th, & 10th ****Please bring immunization** records to your appointment

"Getting children all of the vaccines recommended by CDC's immunization schedule is one of the most important things parents can do to protect their children from serious diseases," said Tammy Nelson, Communicable Disease Nurse. "If you haven't done so already, now is the time to check with your child's doctor to find out what vaccines your child needs." Vaccines protect against a number of serious and potentially life-threatening diseases. When children are not vaccinated, they are

When children are not vaccinated, they are at increased risk for diseases and can also spread diseases to others in their classrooms and community – including babies who are too young to be fully vaccinated, and people with weakened immune systems due to cancer or other health conditions. Talk to your child's doctor to find out which vaccines are recommended for them before going back to school.

As the new school year approaches, the Knox County Health Department and Community Health Center wants to remind you about these important school immunizations. Most immunizations are administered before a child is two years old; however, between ages four and six, before entering kindergarten; children are due for several booster shots. Children between 11 and 15 years of age might be due for booster shots, too. Most students will also need a complete physical exam, especially students who participate in school sports. College freshman that will be living in a dorm should consider the Meningococcal vaccination: this vaccine is available at the Knox County Health Department.

"We want to help make it easier for parents to know which vaccines are required for enrollment in schools" Tammy Nelson, LPN Communicable Disease. The following immunizations are required of children as a prerequisite to admission to schools:

Diphtheria Pertussis (whooping cough) Tetanus (lockjaw) Polio Measles Mumps Rubella (German measles) Varicella (chicken pox) Haemophilus influenzae type B Hepatitis B Prevnar

Meningitis

Most private health insurance programs cover the cost of vaccinations, and the state-funded Vaccine for Children Program supplies vaccines to those with no insurance coverage and underinsured. The Knox Community Health Center accepts most insurances, Medicaid, Medicare, uninsured, underinsured, and also sliding fee scale is available. Physician offices are very busy at this time of year scheduling these physicals, call early for an appointment. We want to help parents become aware that immunizations are important and not just school requirements, states Tammy Nelson, LPN, Communicable Disease." Continual governmental research indicates that vaccines play a pivotal role in a child's overall health and protects from preventable diseases that could be extremely harmful.

Encourage friends, family and others in the community to check their medical records and remind them of the importance of being up-to-date on their immunizations. Please contact the Knox Community Helath Center at 344-2225 to schedule an appointment or visit www.knoxcountyhealth.org for information about school/sports physicals, immunizations and available vaccines.

Barbecue Sweet Potato Chips

Ingredients

1/8 teaspoon cayenne pepper

- 1/4 teaspoon garlic powder
- 1/4 teaspoon smoked paprika
- 1/4 teaspoon kosher salt
- 1/2 teaspoon sweet paprika
- Canola, vegetable, or peanut oil, for frying (About 1 quart)
- 1 large sweet potato (about 1 pound), very thinly sliced on a mandoline

Directions

Combine the spices in a small bowl and set aside. Pour one inch of oil into a large dutch oven or heavy pot



over moderately high heat. Heat the oil until it reaches 375°F on a deep-fry thermometer. Adjust flame to maintain temperature.

Working in batches, place the sweet potatoes in the hot oil, occasionally flipping and moving the slices with a slotted spoon or a wire mesh spider. Fry the potatoes until the edges curl and the potatoes become golden brown and crisp, 3-4 minutes total. Transfer the fried potatoes to a baking sheet lined with paper towels and immediately sprinkle with some of the spice mix.

When all the chips are fried, transfer them to a large bowl or serving platter and sprinkle on any remaining spice mix. Serve immediately.
