

Sometimes big jobs fill small windows

On hectic days, I humor myself with thoughts to add a lengthy extension cord to my hair dryer. That way, I can multi-task and trash a few more sticky-note reminders of things that need done. Rather, I dry my hair and resort to prioritization of the to-do list, a difficult task when everything ranks of equal importance.

Welcome to this spring's situation on the farm, where spring planting and related field work all happened at once in a short time due to unfavorable weather. Mother Nature delivered an abnormally cool March and then the second-coldest April on state record. She also tossed in snow for three Sundays in a row, Palm Sunday and Easter included. The result: Easter egg hunts inside the farm shop and no spraying, fertilizing, planting, gardening, mowing and little fertilizer application before late April. On top of that, the weather prompted

grass to stay dormant longer than normal. With no grass to eat, cattle needed hay, which led to a forage shortage and high hay prices throughout the area. Calves kept coming, one of our few signs of spring. And despite the season's lingering cool and wet field conditions, our guys avoided thumbtwiddling. They cleaned out some old farm buildings and even brought the combine into the shop for harvest maintenance before we planted a single seed for the season.

When field conditions warmed and dried in late April, farmers across Illinois collectively showcased an impressive performance of preparedness and efficiency. Farming's springtime to-dos happened fast and efficiently in a condensed window of time. Bigger, high-tech equipment deserves some of the credit, as does farmer ambition. When the weather turned, our corn and soybean planters started at the same time, my cousin supplied seed to both, our most tenured employee ran a reduced-tillage tool across some of our acreage, and my dad sprayed with limited help for water and herbicide refills.

The condensed schedule inundated the local FS service center for "need-it-now" fertilizer and herbicide applications. It overwhelmed local service technicians with more machinery breakdowns than men available to fix them. Local dealers kept a hectic pace with demands for seed. And my husband worked with his team of precision farming specialists to keep the season's field applications straight, accurate, and working as they should from a technology

What a speedy spring. Just like the rest of farm country, our guys worked in all directions during this overly hectic season, perhaps most evident to my mom as she delivered nightly field meals. And she somehow managed it all without an extension cord.

Legislative **Update**

Greetings,

I'm happy to be again contribute to Knox County Farm Bureau's monthly bulletin and provide an update on Spring Legislative

Session and wins for our district.

As I write to you from the State Capitol today, we are one week away from the scheduled adjournment deadline. The Senate and House leadership members continue to hold budget meetings with Governor Rauner and report positive progress toward a compromise. My colleagues and I are currently very optimistic that we will pass a balanced full-year budgetwith no tax increases—by May 31.

I would like to see a package that incorporates significant property tax relief, business-friendly reforms, increased funding for higher education institutions and investments into infrastructure, so we can make much-needed repairs to our roads, bridges and public transit. I am hopeful that come June, we will see some of these reforms.

This year, our school funding system for K-12 schools made the historic transition to an evidence-based funding model for more datadriven and equitable funding distribution—to ensure every student in Illinois has access to a high-quality education, regardless of their income or zip code. Every school district in the 47th District received more state funding under the new formula. My local superintendents are very enthusiastic and have let me know how they're using the additional funding to benefit their schools, such as reducing class sizes.

As an active member of the Senate Agriculture Committee and state legislator of nine years, I have dedicated special focus to Illinois' growing agricultural sector and communities. Our most notable agricultural initiative this spring aimed to create more profitable opportunities for farmers. In May, the Senate and House passed a proposal to legalize the growth, cultivation and processing of industrial hemp. With the wide range of uses for hemp, it could prove to be a new agricultural commodity in Illinois.

This session, I also sponsored and supported initiatives to: improve the reporting of sexual offenses for victims; permit Illinois hunters to use an electronic hunting license; defend spouse-to-spouse land transfers from higher property taxes; combat robo calls and caller ID falsification; push for a capital bill to fund the renovation of Quincy Veterans' Home; and oppose attempts to impose a graduated income tax in Illinois.

Lastly, I'd like to shine a light on our local 4-H organizations. I have had the opportunity to visit with them in the district and at the Capitol, and I cannot express what an utterly positive impact it has on the members' lives. So many have told me the organization taught them the importance of leadership and hard work, especially in the area of agriculture.

I frequently like to keep in touch with my local farm bureaus and agricultural producers to better advocate for you here in Springfield. 



Health on the Farm

By the Knox County Health Department



Harmless pest or world's deadliest creature?

The deadliest animal on earth is not a shark nor a tiger or crocodile. Can you guess it? It's smaller than the size of your pinky. It's not a snake, a spider, or a poisonous creature. Believe it or not, it's actually an insect. Sometimes mistaken as just a nuisance or a burden, this deadly insect actually causes about 725,000 deaths a year. It's caused age-old diseases like yellow fever and malaria and has gotten more attention in the last few years for causing Zika. If you haven't figured it out, here's one last hint: if you're not careful, you'll find it biting at you early in the morning while in your garden or in the evening as you cookout on the grill.

The deadliest animal on earth is the mosquito. There are actually different types of mosquitoes and they are all different. Some are slightly larger, others live in specific regions, and different mosquitoes carry different diseases. Here in Illinois, we are on the lookout for a kind called the Culex pipiens. These mosquitoes feed from dusk to dawn and are responsible for spreading the West

West Nile is a mosquito-borne virus that is spread throughout the summer and fall. Most people who get bit by an infected mosquito won't get sick but a few people will develop a fever and brain swelling. This happens most often to the elderly and people with a weak immune system, although it's still possible for a completely healthy person to fall sick. Unfortunately, dieases that are spread by mosquitoes, ticks, and fleas are becoming more common: they have more than tripled since 2004. Currently, there are no vaccines to fight the virus. The best things you can do to protect yourself and your family as you enjoy the outdoors this summer is to follow the 3 R's: reduce breeding sites, repel mosquitoes, and

report sickness and dead birds.

REDUCE: Mosquitoes like to breed in stagnant water. This includes bodies of water as large as ponds and as small as kids' toy buckets. To help get rid of mosquito breeding sites, reduce the places around your house that can collect water. Check out these places: old tires, buckets, planters, toys, pools, birdbaths, flowerpots, trash containers, and clogged gutters. Empty standing water completely and replace water in pools, plants, and birdbaths on a weekly basis.

REPEL: Use repellant with DEET or oil of lemon eucalyptus. Check with your doctor if you are pregnant or have infants. Wear clothing that covers your arms and legs or consider buying clothing that's been treated with permethrin. Close doors and windows whenever possible and repair screen holes so mosquitoes can't sneak in.

REPORT: Report sickness and stay on the lookout for dead birds. That's rightmosquitoes also like to bite birds and this can be a sign that the virus is in the area. If you find a crow, raven, or jay that has recently died but has no sign of foul play, then you can call the local health department to collect and test it.

The Knox County Health Department conducts active surveillance for West Nile Virus through mosquito trapping and collection of dead birds. If a dead bird is found between now and October 15th and appears to have died of natural causes, residents should report the sighting to the Health Department Monday thru Friday, 8:00am to 4:00pm at 309-344-2224; for more information regarding West Nile Virus please call the Knox County Health Department at 309-344-2224 or visit www.knoxcountyhealth.org.



Apples on Horseback

Ingredients

16 thin slices of pancetta

- 1 Pink Lady apple peeled and cut into 16 wedges
- 3 ounces Manchego cheese, sixteen sliced 1/4 inch thick and cut into 2-by-1/2 inch sticks

Sixteen 2-inch rosemary sprigs or toothpicks, for skewers



Instructions

Preheat grill pan. Place an apple wedge and cheese stick in center of each pancetta slice.


