More than 59,000 job openings will be available - per year - in agriculture, food, renewable natural resources and related industries through at least 2025, according to the 2020-2025 Employment Opportunities Report by the U.S. Department of Agriculture and Purdue University.

Students who enjoy biochemistry perhaps haven't thought to consider a career in agronomy or biofuels. The mechanically minded may like a profession as an agriculture engineer or precision agriculture specialist. Writers may find fitting opportunities as agricultural journalists.

For good reason, the wall in our high school agriculture classroom says, "Your Career Starts Here." In the last 10 years alone, I have watched students at our small school find their passions through agricultural education and the leadership and career-developing experiences of the FFA.

They now serve the agriculture industry as

agronomists, farm financial officers, agricultural educators, agricultural engineers, livestock managers and diesel technicians. My husband has hired graduates to work with precision technologies and vehicle autonomy in agriculture. Some prepare for an ag-related career, training to become agricultural accountants, veterinarians and horticulturists.

The Illinois Agri-Food Alliance, of which the Illinois Farm Bureau is a founding member, recently launched AGNITOR, a digital platform to connect agri-food professionals to classrooms for virtual chats about careers. The program intends to generate student awareness about career opportunities spanning agriculture, food and natural resources. The National FFA offers opportunities to digitally explore agricultural careers, too. These tools can help students like our daughter find their ideal fit in this diverse and necessary industry.

# **Septic System Maintenance**

Spring has sprung and with warmer weather approaching, now is a great time to get caught up on maintenance around the house that you have been putting off throughout the winter. This maintenance can include spring cleaning, painting, and even septic system maintenance! For those that live in municipalities, your home is connected to a public sewer system that transfers your wastewater to a wastewater treatment plant. However, for those that live in rural areas without access to public sewer, the wastewater from the house is discharged into a private sewage disposal system, or commonly called a "septic system."

The septic system is designed to receive all wastewater from the home including from sinks, bathtubs, showers, and toilets. As the wastewater and solids go down the drain, they flow into a septic tank where

2335 E. Second Street Galesburg, IL 61401 309-342-3611 the solids will settle out to the bottom of the tank. Bacterial digestion begins in the septic tank and is considered the primary treatment of the septic system. The liquid that remains on the top, commonly known as "effluent," flows out of the tank and gravity flows to a subsurface seepage field. This field disperses the effluent into the soil utilizing the existing soil particles to complete the bacterial digestion, known as secondary treatment, and returns the clean effluent to the water table below the ground.

How does a homeowner know if their septic system is not working properly? Signs of an improperly working septic system may include wastewater backing up through the drains in the house, or bright green, spongy grass appearing over the septic tank or drain field even during dry weather. Follow these do's and don'ts to maintain your septic system:

**Do-** Know the location of your septic system and drain field.

**Do-** Locate new patios, driveways, carports, and concrete pads away from the septic tank and drain field.

**Do**- Have your septic tank pumped every three to five years.

**Do & Don't**- It's OK to plant grass over septic system, but that is it. Certain types of plants, shrubs, and trees with deep root systems can invade septic pipes and drain fields.

**Don't-** Add a room, deck, or patio to your house within 10 feet of your septic tank.

**Don't** – Install a septic system within 75 feet of a private water well.

Don't - Drive or park heavy machines/



What goes down your drain has a big impact on your septic system. Avoid harsh chemicals and use cleaners/ detergents in moderation. Learn more at www.epa.gov/septic.

automobiles over the septic system. The weight can damage pipes or the tank. It can also compact the soil in your drainfield, which can prevent water from leaching deep into the ground.

**Don't** – Treat the system with household cleaners. It can kill the useful bacteria in the tank that breaks down the waste.

**Don't** – Pour cooking grease down the kitchen drain.

**Don't** – Flush any household or personal products down the toilet. They are slow to biodegrade, they can clog your system's pipes.

Septic systems, like any other system or equipment regularly used by homeowners, require an understanding of their functions and limitations. Proper maintenance and use of your septic system can allow it to thrive for many years to come. ### **Recipe of the Month** Strawberry Shortcake Fluff Salad

#### Ingredients:

- 2 pints fresh strawberries, sliced
- 1/2 loaf pound cake or angel food cake
- 10.5 oz mini marshmallows
- 8 oz whipped cream topping
- 14 oz sweetened condensed milk

#### Instructions:

- 1. Cut pound cake or angel food cake in half. Cut any dark edges off ½ loaf cake. Cut half the loaf cake into 1 ½ inch cubes.
- 2. Mix whipped cream topping and sweetened condensed milk together in a large bowl.
- 3. Stir in marshmallows.
- 4. Slice strawberries, add to bowl.
- 5. Fold ingredients together until well combined.
- 6. Cover and refrigerate until ready to serve.
- 7. Serve within 1-3 days.
