Fine Swine Dining

Pork delicious, economical mealtime tradition

Sometime around age 40, my guilty pleasure food changed to pulled pork nachos: tortilla chips softened with melted nacho cheese, topped with pulled pork and drizzled with barbecue sauce.

I ordered a boat of them at the only Illini football game we attended last fall. The day-time high reached 34 degrees with sustained winds around 15 mph against our faces in the upper deck. The nacho cheese congealed, napkins blew, and my gloveless hand turned a bit numb. But, I pulled down my fleece face

mask and ate them anyway.

Memories are made at mealtime and what better month to celebrate pork on the menu than October, National Pork Month. Pork represented the world's most widely eaten meat in 2022, and Illinois ranks No. 4 in the United States in its production.

Our family cherishes the tradition of ham for the holidays. We slow life's pace when we put racks of pork ribs on the smoker on a weekend afternoon. Our son microwaves bacon for breakfast before school. Sunday night means sausage on either store-bought or homemade pizza. And well-seasoned pork burgers reign at county fairs – no ketchup or garnish necessary.

Prepared to the correct temperature, pork proves moist and delicious. The meat is nutritious in its leanest cuts, and pork adds considerable flavor at an economical price. I figure my family of four can eat a 6-ounce serving of lean pork loin every day for a week for less than \$30. Dress it up with pork gravy


or change it up with stir fry and that's some fine swine dining for the week.

Pork is a powerful and productive protein. Pork loin, pork sirloin and pork tenderloin pack around 23 grams of protein in 3 ounces. Over the last 30 years, farmers have reduced pork's saturated fat content by 27%, and since my grandpa raised pigs, farmers require 76% less land and 25% water to produce a pound of the protein.

This week, I made 10 pounds of pulled pork from pork tenderloin, a new favorite on the back porch smoker. Mom watched a food show where chunks of loin are "pulled" in a stand mixer. The result: an easy, flavorful and lean meat for pulled pork sandwiches, pork tacos, protein on salad, or toppings on barbecue pizza.

Tonight, a pork-loaded nacho summons me.

Harvest is here, farmers are reminded to put safety first

Harvest is here, which means farmers are already moving equipment on roads, harvesting their crop, and hauling it to elevators. Over the next few weeks they'll be working longer hours—starting their days before sunrise without resting until long after sunset. The pressure to keep going can be intense and can lead to accidents, injuries and even death.

COUNTRY Financial® urges farmers to take extra caution when out on the road or in their fields and to keep a close watch on their health. The number of accidents and deaths are disturbing; however, much can be done to curb them.

According to the Centers for Disease Control, the leading sources of youth ag-related deaths include machinery (23 percent), motor vehicles and ATVs (19 percent) and drowning (16 percent).

The following are some easy tips farmers can follow to be safe.

- 1. Maintain your equipment. Most farm accidents and deaths involve machinery. Make sure your equipment is maintained according to the manufacturers' recommendations.
- 2. Avoid driving machinery on roads at dawn and dusk. Most accidents happen during these times of day. The morning and afternoon/evening hours are also peak commuting times for drivers heading to and from work which only increases the chances of accidents.
- 3. Tell family and helping hands where you'll be working and when. Let others know

where you are. Also, have a cell phone or twoway radio on you at all times in case of emergencies or accidents. Keep your electronics charged and on the ready. Plan to communicate at set times of the day to ensure everyone is safe and okay.

- 4. Get plenty of rest and take frequent breaks. Drink plenty of fluids frequently and have healthy snacks on hand to keep your energy levels up. Accidents are more likely to happen once fatigue sets in.
- 5. Familiarize yourself with how your prescriptions and over the counter medications affect reaction time. Some medications and machinery don't mix. Consult your doctor if your medications make you feel drowsy or impair your ability to safely operate your equipment.
- 6. Know your limitations. Don't push your mind and body past safe, healthy limits. Know when to stop for the day and when to stay in bed if you feel sick.
- 7. Keep combines and tractors clean and lubricated. Avoid fires by cleaning off your equipment each day and following the manufacturer's lubrication schedule.

Farmers should make safety a priority. Make sure to follow maintenance schedules, don't take shortcuts if equipment breaks down, and make sure your equipment is visible on the road. Check your lights, slow-moving vehicle emblems and reflective tape, ensuring they're more visible to other drivers.



16. DISPOSAL OF WASTE

We support:

- 1. Waste volume reduction at the source. Every effort should be made to avoid generating waste products.
- 2. Recycling and reuse. We encourage manufacturers to develop cost-effective uses for recyclable products. We will work towards the development of incentives to create additional markets and uses for these recycled products.
- 3. Retailers and consumers using returnable, recyclable, and degradable containers.
- 4. Research on voluntary recycling options for agricultural plastics.
- 5. Source separation, which includes:
- A. Incentives for the return of all glass, plastic, or metal beverage containers.
 - B. Local recycling programs.
- C. Composting. We support research on the effects of using yard waste on agricultural land.
 - 6. Research on the effects of energy re-

- 7. Combustion for volume reduction. Where it can be shown to be economically feasible and environmentally safe, incineration of solid waste before disposing in a landfill.
 - 8. Landfilling as a final alternative.
- 9. Legislation specifying that publication requirements for public hearings on the siting of solid waste disposal facilities be the same as those of the Illinois Truth in Taxation Act.
- 10. The ability of a municipality to reject the location of a landfill within 1 1/2 miles of the municipality's boundary.
- 11. Appropriate local governments providing refuse disposal services at a reasonable cost to residents within their area if no private services are available.
- 12. Improvement of regulations to ensure safe transportation of hazardous
- 13. Enforcement of existing laws and regulatory programs which require environmentally safe waste disposal systems.
- 14. Encouraging county Farm Bureaus to actively monitor permit applications for siting of non- agricultural pollution control facilities submitted to their County Boards.
- 15. Delegation agreements granting counties authority to regulate landfill operations within their jurisdiction, including hours of operation and the height of landfills.
- 16. Efforts to impose appropriate fines and penalties on waste disposal violations.
- 17. Reasonable disposal fees on residential waste to help avoid dumping in rural areas.
- 18. Allowing local governments to charge a higher fee, tax or surcharge on special waste and out-of-area waste than

on local residential waste.

- 19. Efforts to have Illinois classify outof-state waste as stringently as its classification in the state of origin.
- 20. Regular and thorough inspection of waste disposal sites.
- 21. "Landfarming" of contaminated soils to preserve limited space available in landfills.
- 22. Research into laser gasification for mining of landfills and disposal of garbage.
- 23. Allowing farmers to burn or bury old agricultural buildings and brush on existing sites.
- 24. Allowing the burning and burying of building debris in cases of natural disasters.
- 25. Changes to the laws and policies regarding used tire collections, including:
- A. An increase in the number of times an individual can participate in a tire clean-up event.
- B. Allowing non-governmental organizations to sponsor a used tire collection program.

- C. The Illinois Environmental Protection Agency (IEPA) setting up drop off areas for used tires.
- 26. Investigation into alternative methods for disposal of urban sludge containing heavy metals and continued research on the safe application of urban sludge on agricultural farmland. Agencies should make research results on immediate and long-term effects of sludge application available to farmers.
- 27. An environmentally safe and financially acceptable method to dispose of or recycle used oil and unwanted farm and home chemicals.

We oppose:

- 1. Transportation of solid waste over long distances for disposal.
- 2. Efforts which lead to the importation of solid waste into rural areas without proper consideration being given to residents neighboring the disposal site.
- 3. Attempts to weaken the role of local governments or the criteria by which the sites are judged in the siting of non-agricultural pollution control facilities.

Health on the Farm By the Knox County Health Department

Breast Cancer Awareness Month

October is National Breast Cancer Awareness Month, and we at the Knox County Health Department and Knox Community Health Center are encouraging women and men around the county to take a closer look at their overall health.

According to the American Cancer Society (ACS) about 1 in 3 (or 30%) of all new breast cancers each year are to females. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) states breast cancer is often found in women, but men can get breast cancer too. About 1 out of every 100-breast cancer diagnosed in the United States is found in a man. No matter your age or how well you feel, yearly checkups and screenings are an integral part of the fight against breast cancer.

Importance of early detection

Certain signs and symptoms are early indicators of breast cancer, but many early symptoms are difficult to detect on your own. With routine yearly screenings, such as mammograms for women who are 40 years old or older, your doctor can catch early indicators of breast cancer and address the issue with further testing.

Know the Signs and Symptoms of Breast Cancer

Since early detection is so important, yearly mammograms or other screenings might come too late if other signs and symptoms of breast cancer arise. The most common sign of breast cancer development is a new lump or mass in the breast, but there are other early indicators. These symptoms include:

• Breast or nipple pain

- Swelling to part or all the breast
- Changes to the skin on your breast (color/temperature)
- Discharge
- Swollen lymph nodes under the arm or collar bone

Any of these symptoms could be early indicators of breast cancer or possibly other medical issues. That is why we encourage individuals to reach out to a qualified health provider when experiencing any of these symptoms.

Have you heard about the availability of breast and cervical exams to all women whether they have health insurance or not? The Illinois Breast & Cervical Cancer Program (IBCCP) offers FREE mammograms, clinical breast exams, and pap tests, with the provider of YOUR choice, to those who qualify! This program has been providing breast and cervical cancer screening to women of Illinois since 1995. There are no income guidelines for this program. You may be eligible for this program if:

- You live in Knox, Warren, or Henderson County
- You are between the ages of 40 and 64
- You have no medical insurance, including Medicaid or Medicare Part B, or your health insurance will not cover these services

Your health insurance will not cover these services, the deductible is a financial hardship, or you have no health insurance.

The Knox County Health Department has a qualified Clinical Patient Navigator who is there for you to ensure those who are
