Transport by Trailer College move-in successful minus the pigs

The gal in the neighboring dorm room rented a U-Haul to transport her belongings to college. Other families had minivans with the back seats removed for their students. We had a pickup truck pulling a livestock trailer that stated the name and location of our farm.

I avoided eye contact with the upperclassmen helpers as my dad removed the pin, lifted the bar lock assembly and swung open the rear gate. With ease, the trailer held my bookshelf, mini-fridge, microwave and

television with built-in VCR. I grabbed a our wedding reception. lamp and headed to my second-floor room. Perhaps the volunteers didn't realize this rig hauled pigs most other days of the year.

For six consecutive years, livestock trailers hauled my brother or me to college. Later, they moved us to new homes. The trailers were "special-event spotless," or as clean as possible with a pressure washer and relentless focus on the toughest layers of manure. We cleaned the trailers with the same precision for a shining appearance at the county 4-H fair livestock shows.

My college move-in experience merely represented the norm for a farm kid: Farmers maximizing the potential of their farm equipment. As a child, Mom swam in a large, round livestock water tank, which served the cattle when she and her brothers were done with it. Old tractor tires became sandboxes. The hayrack doubled as a float in the homecoming parade. We used the farm shop for kids.

By my senior year, I appreciated the practicality of our pig-turned-furniture hauler. Now, our kids witness my tolerance of embarrassment. The minivan (my farm car) has mudflaps and rugged, all-terrain tires. I take an insulated delivery bag into the local pizza places. Mistaken for DoorDash, I explain the bag keeps both pizza and field meals warm in transit to rural locations.

So if you see a livestock trailer backing with ease to the neighboring sidewalk, admire the skill. Then, just realize it's likely not a cow moving in next door, but rather someone with some unique resources potentially sharable with friends.

93. NUTRITION

We support:

- 1. United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) efforts to expand the use of dietetically wholesome and nutritious foods in all school meals and other nutrition programs and shall not be limited to locallygrown or organic production.
- 2. Renaming high fructose corn syrup to corn sugar.
- 3. Greater flexibility with the National School Lunch and Breakfast programs to ensure local school districts are able to determine how to meet the nutritional needs of their students.

4. Equal access of pasteurized dairy products, including whole milk, by the USDA national school lunch program and by the armed forces.

We oppose financial penalties on local school districts for serving meals that do not meet current federal mandates in the National School Lunch and Breakfast pro-

116. FEDERAL ESTATE TAXES

We support:

- 1. Permanently repealing federal estate taxes while retaining a stepped-up basis at the time of inheritance.



National Food Safety Education Month Know the Four Steps for Food Safety

September is National Food Safety Education Month and it's the perfect time to learn the key steps for food safety. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recommends following these four simple steps at home- Clean, Separate, Cook, and Chill- can help protect you and your loved ones from food poisoning.

Clean: Wash your hands and surfaces often

Germs that cause food poisoning can survive in many places and spread around your kitchen.

Wash your hands for at least 20 seconds with soap and water before, during, and after preparing food and before eating.

Always wash hands after handling cooked

September is National Food Safety meat, chicken and other poultry, seafood, lucation Month and it's the perfect time to flour, or eggs.

Wash your utensils, cutting boards, and countertops with hot, soapy water after preparing each food item.

Separate: Don't cross-contaminate

When grocery shopping, keep raw meat, poultry, seafood, and their juices away from other foods.

Keep raw or marinating meat separate from all other foods in the refrigerator. Store raw meat, poultry, and seafood in sealed containers or wrap them securely so the juices don't leak.

Use one cutting board or plate for raw meat and separate cutting board or plates for produce, bread, and other foods that won't be cooked.

Cook to the right temperature.

Check the temperature with a food thermometer! Make sure food is cooked to a safe internal temperature before you eat it. Not sure what the correct temperature is? The U.S. Food and Drug Administraiton's Food Code requires:

- Poultry and stuffed poultry should be cooked to 165° F and held for 15 seconds.
- Ground beef and ground pork should be cooked to 155° F and held for 15 seconds.
- Whole cuts of beef and pork should be cooked to 145° F and held for 4 minutes
- Fish, seafood, and eggs should be cooked to 145° F and held for 15 seconds.

Chill: Refrigerate promptly

Refrigerate perishable food (meat, seafood, dairy, cut fruit, some vegetables, and cook leftovers) within 2 hours. (or 1 hour if kept in air temperatures above 90° F).

Thaw frozen food safely in the refrigera-


