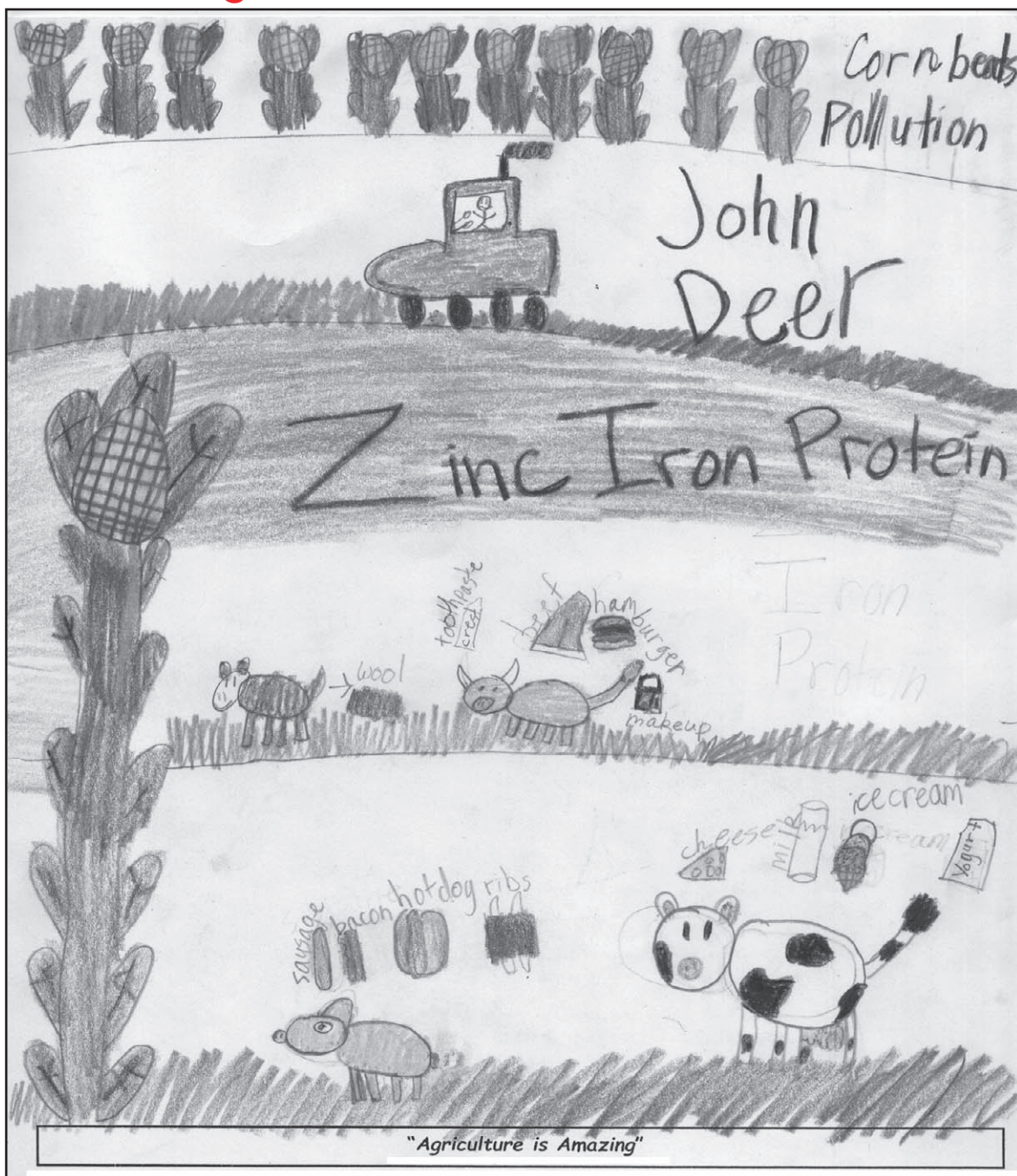

"Ag in a Day" Teacher Workshops Scheduled

Join area County Farm Bureaus at the "Ag in a Day" teacher workshops for hands-on activities, farm tours, and free resources for your classroom. The workshops will be held on June 9th and 10th. The workshops are completely free to attend and will include lunch and refreshments both days.

The "Ag in a Day" workshops are open to all teachers and educators. Teachers will have the choice to attend workshops at two different locations:

June 9: Knox Agri-Center, 180 S. Soangetaha Rd, Galesburg, IL 61401. Tours will take place in Galesburg and surrounding area.

June 10: Silvis HyVee, 2001 5th St, Silvis, IL 61282. Tours will take place in East Moline and surrounding area.

Teachers are invited to attend both courses, or whichever date and location is most convenient. Educators will receive free teaching materials, participate in hands-on activities, view Ag in the Classroom educational kits, and take field trips to areas of interest in order to learn more about agriculture. There is no cost to attend and there will be ample opportunities for teachers to win prizes and resources for their classrooms.

At the Galesburg workshop, teachers will learn about re-

sources available from Illinois Ag in the Classroom, learn about the importance of bees, visit the animal disease lab at Carl Sandburg College, and the day will conclude with a tour of a beef farm in Altona, Illinois.

In Aledo, teachers will tour a HyVee store, tour a dairy farm in East Moline, learn about the technology that John Deere uses, agriculture lessons that can be taught in the classroom will be demonstrated, and a tour of Whitey's production plant will be given.

The workshops are designed for Preschool - High School educators who wish to expand their curriculum to include topics related to agriculture - the world's food and fiber system. The workshops will focus on how to integrate available resources and hands-on activities about agriculture into an existing classroom curriculum.

Most farm homes attest to untouchable toys

Empty farm toy boxes take up more space in our attic than any other category of items, whether suitcases or childhood memorabilia. To my husband's defense, my addiction to Christmas décor doesn't count. We store seasonal items in a separate place, and besides, one of the themed trees uses tractor ornaments anyway.
I reiterate: these toy boxes are empty. They sit there untouched, ideal for recycling, except I am told their disposal would deteriorate the value of the 30 toy tractors and combines on display in our house.

From a farm family's standpoint, the presence of "for-display-only" farm toys in the home seems as natural as fruit on the kitchen counter. In contrast, we eat the fruit or make banana bread if we wait too long. The 23 tractors and combines in our living room alone rest securely in their cabinet every day of the year minus the infrequent dusting. No kid fingerprints. No carpet farming. Only viewing. The shiny replicas of farming's mechanical marvels even earn their own spotlight, which we illuminate almost nightly. Meanwhile, my good China sits in darkness.
Grandpa's recent 80th birthday party redirected my attention to this normal, symbolic part of our everyday life. The kids and grandkids together created a "Top 80" list, which revealed 80 fun and loving facts about my grandpa, a lifelong farmer. The first statement: "A toy collection that never gets played with."
My aunt from California's L.A. suburbs contributed this observation. She referred to the farm toy collection that neatly lines several shelves on the walls of Grandpa's tidy garage. They sit, unopened and out of child reach.
All my farming relatives own farm toys. Some replicate equipment currently or once owned on the farm. I identify most

of these displays as idle, collected over time without aggressive desires to make additions. My dad places toys atop the farm office bookshelves, my husband keeps a second, smaller display in our bedroom and one of my uncles keeps them behind glass, too.
I remember when our son, at 18 months old, would gaze into the glass cabinet in our living room. Even the neighbor boy has stopped playing to stare. Adult visitors have commented, too. The display becomes fodder for conversation. Meanwhile, our kids own plenty of toys to farm the carpet or dig in the garden.
Grandpa does use one display toy as a mock alarm clock, a fact that also made the "Top 80" list. He carries a noise-making silo set – still in its box – into the sleeping chambers of his West Coast grandkids when they visit the farm. He causes a racket and informs them, "Wake up! You're on the farm!"
Where not every toy earns play time.

Illinois Farm Families' City Moms Tour Illinois Hog Farm

Illinois Farm Families was busy in March, with more than 320 new "Likes" on Facebook and more than 40 new Twitter Followers.
Illinois Farm Families also received national recognition and was presented with the Meritorious Service in Communications award from the American Society of Professional Farm Managers and Rural Appraisers for the City Mom program.
To top it off, the 2015 Illinois Farm Families' City Moms visited the Gould hog farm early in the month. The moms toured the farm's buildings while learning about biosecurity, what goes into raising healthy piglets and gestation stalls.
The moms watched a demonstration on proper pork handling techniques and heard from representatives from TriOak Foods and Hormel Foods Corporation to get the full-circle story of pig production.
Following the tour, many of the 2015 City Moms said some of their concerns about hog production had been diminished. In fact, 25 City Moms were very or somewhat concerned about

animal welfare before the tour. Following the tour, only 10 of the City Moms said they were very or somewhat concerned about animal welfare.
Additionally:
•Prior to the tour, 20 City Moms were very or somewhat concerned about the use of gestation stalls. After the tour, 11 City Moms were very or somewhat concerned.
•Prior to the tour, 22 City Moms were very or somewhat concerned about the use of antibiotics. After the tour, 3 City Moms were very or somewhat concerned.
•Prior to the tour, 21 City Moms were very or somewhat concerned about the use of hormones. After the tour, 4 City moms were very or somewhat concerned.
•Prior to the tour, 14 City Moms were very or somewhat concerned about labels or marketing claims on pork products. After the tour, 2 City moms were very or somewhat concerned.

Illinois Department Of Agriculture To Offer Free Recycling Program For Agrichemical Containers

The Illinois Department of Agriculture is encouraging farmers and agrichemical facilities to save their empty agrichemical containers. The department announced today it has arranged to recycle them. Beginning at the end of July and continuing in August, sites throughout the state will collect containers. The containers will be recycled to make shipping pallets, fence posts, drainage tubing, plastic lumber and other useful products.

"This program offers farmers and agrichemical facilities a convenient opportunity to dispose of empty pesticide containers and demonstrate their environmental stewardship," Agriculture Director Philip Nelson said. "I would encourage them to gather any containers that they may have been planning to throw in the garbage and take them to the nearest collection site." Metal and household pesticide containers are not eligible for the

recycling program. Collection sites will accept only high-density polyethylene, #2 plastic, agrichemical containers that are clean and dry. Participants are responsible for rinsing them and removing all caps, labels, booklets and foil seals.

The program is a cooperative venture between the Illinois Department of Agriculture, Agriculture Container Recycling Council, GROWMARK, Inc., Illinois Fertilizer and Chemical

Association, Container Services Network, Illinois Farm Bureau and University of Illinois Extension. To obtain a free brochure about the program, call the Illinois Department of Agriculture toll free at 1-800-641-3934.

Ms. Farmer's Report

Spring has arrived at last. It has been interesting to watch the fields being prepared and planted. One fourth grade school studied trees this month. Students learned about coniferous and deciduous trees, parts of the tree (including xylem, cambium, and phloem). The students then enjoyed making a tree cookie showing the growth rings.

The hot topic for April was Earth Day. Students learned about the three "R's" - Reduce, Reuse, and Recycle. The students were amazed at some the things that can be recycled (examples: jeans into pencils, also green currency into pencils, corn into plastic spoons and golf tees, etc.). Third grade students made a cycle with a paper soda can to show the process by which a soda can is recycled. Fourth grade classes play the "I have/ Who has? game.

Farm Web is a popular topic. A comparison of farms today as to farms of past years (students had read Charlotte's Web) were part of the discussion. The discussion included how specialized farming is today. Students were very involved with putting the Farm Web together on the floor to match which foods come from the correct commodity.

At Churchill Junior High Ms. Farmer presented a lesson about plants. Students made the Beanie Babies to watch a soybean sprout. They also made a bean book which included the terms of seed coat, cotyledon, and embryo. The hit of the day was tasting the different foods that represented the various parts of the plant. They surprised to learn that cauliflower and broccoli are the flowers of the plant.

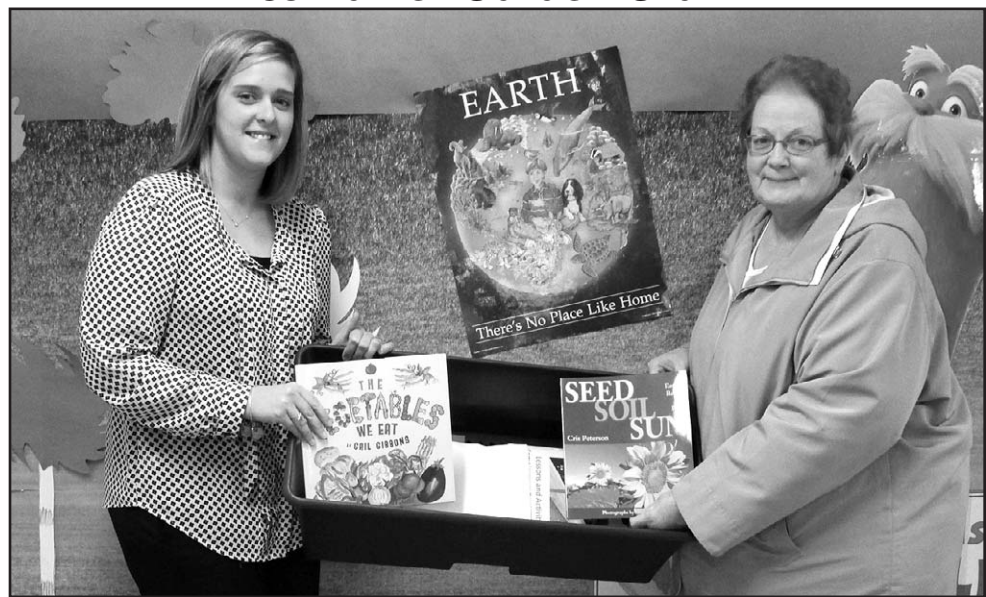

Knox County Farm Bureau to Host Informational Nutrient Loss Reduction Strategy Meeting

The Knox County Farm Bureau is partnering with the Illinois Council on Best Management Practices (CBMP) to host a Nutrient Loss Reduction Strategy (NLRs) meeting June 8 at 8 a.m. at Knox Agri-Center in Galesburg.

Intended for those living and/or farming in the Spoon River watershed, which includes Knox County, the meeting will focus on best management practices (BMPs) specific to each region of the state.

"Our state stretches more than 400 miles from north to south. Soil types and farming practices change depending on where you are," said Chris Hausman, CBMP President and District 12 Director, Illinois Farm Bureau. "This meeting will give farmers and other stakeholders the opportunity to discuss how the strategy will impact them at their local watershed level and will arm them with information about on-farm BMPs they can use. Farmers also will learn all that is being done to reduce nutrient losses and how to build on current successes."

Scheduled for release in July, the strategy provides a framework for reducing nutrient losses, improving local water quality and improving the quality of water leaving the state and entering the Gulf of Mexico. Faced with raising more food while protecting natural resources, the Il-

linois agricultural community is taking on that challenge. Illinois farmers have the support of CBMP and of other organizations as they adopt voluntary enhanced nutrient stewardship and conservation practices.

The meeting is one of 11 being hosted across the state in June. For a complete list of meeting locations, visit www.illinoiscbmp.org.

Farmers are invited to bring water samples from their farms to be tested on-site during the meeting. A meal will be provided and the event is free. Attendees are asked to RSVP to Knox County Farm Bureau at (309) 342-2036 or knoxcfb@knoxcfb.org.

Health on the Farm

By the Knox County Health Department



Celebrating Women

The Knox County Health Department and Knox Community Health Center are encouraging women in our lives- our mothers, grandmothers, aunts, sisters, cousins, friends, and colleagues – to take steps to live healthier, happier lives.

We know that women are often the ones who make sure everyone else in our families are cared for. But too often, we put our own health last.

But the reality is unless you take care of yourself, you cannot really take care of your family. That means eating right, exercising, quitting smoking, and getting the care necessary to stay healthy. In fact, you can now use websites, apps, and mobile devices to help you track and manage your health.

Preventative services are critical to helping us stay healthy, but unfortunately they have not always been affordable. Thanks to the Affordable Care Act, it is a new day for women's health making it easier for women to take control of their own health. For many women, preventive services like mammograms, birth control, smoking cessation services, and annual well-woman visits are now available without any out-of-pocket costs.

Need a refresher course on your recommended screenings?

- Once a month breast self-exam: check for unusual lumps or bumps monthly so you can stay on top of any changes. The best time to do it is a few days after your period ends.

- Every six months dental check-up: Make sure you hit up the dentist's chair twice a year for cleanings and other preventative maintenance.

- Once a year full physical exam: This annual check-up should include a height and weight check, a blood pressure screening, a clinical breast exam, and any blood tests your doctor deems necessary. This may include tests for blood sugar, blood count, hormone levels, and other crucial markers.

- Pap smear: Most doctors suggest women see their gynecologist once a year and get a pap smear while they're there. Your pap tests for any changes or abnormalities in the cells in your cervix, which is a way to screen for cervical cancer. If you don't have insurance or can't afford a screening the Knox County Health Department offers the Western Illinois Breast and Cervical Cancer Program (WIBCCP). This program provides FREE mammograms, clinical breast exams, and pap tests to women who qualify. If you live in Henderson, Knox, or Warren Counties, are between the ages of 35-64 please call the Health Department at 344-2224 to see if the WIBCCP can be of assistance to you.

- Mammograms: At 40, women want to start scheduling annual mammograms, though your doctor may recommend screening earlier if you have a family history.

- Colonoscopy: This test should come right around your 50th birthday, unless your family history warrants an earlier screening.

RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Bacon, Eggs & Asparagus

Ingredients

2 cloves garlic, minced
1 T coconut oil
1 T sesame oil
1 bundle asparagus, ends trimmed



4 slices bacon
1 T roasted sesame seeds
4 eggs, poached or fried
Salt to taste

Directions

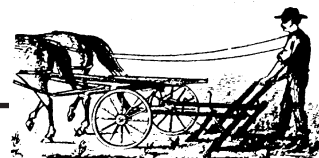
Preheat the oven to 400. In a small bowl, mix together the garlic, coconut oil, and sesame oil.

Line a baking sheet with foil or parchment and place a rack on top. Divide the asparagus spears into four equal bundles, and wrap each

one with a piece of bacon. Place the bundles on the rack with the ends of the bacon underneath.

Brush garlic/oil mixture over bundles, then sprinkle with sesame seeds. Bake for 35-40 minutes or until bacon is crisp. Top with eggs, sprinkle with salt.
